If you slow down, the cars behind you have to slow down, and the people out walking and playing will all be safer. Please think about it.

EXTERIOR UPKEEP REMINDERS

- Avoid blowing leaves/grass into the street
- Edge the driveway, curbs and sidewalk
- Remove debris, tree limbs and other yard litter from your islands and lawn
- Keep pine straw and mulch fresh
- Keep trash cans out of sight from the front of your home
- Replace mailboxes and posts that are leaning or in disrepair
- Replace missing or darkened address numbers

PLAN TO ADDRESS OVERGROWN TREES AT KENSINGTON ENTRANCE

rees are wonderful things and Royal Lakes is blessed with many. But trees, just like shrubs and other plants, can in time become overgrown and adversely affect the general landscape in an area. This is the case today with several trees along both sides of Windsor Drive as you enter the Kensington section of Royal Lakes.

The trees in this area have overgrown to the point where several are now encroaching on the majestic Crepe Myrtles within the center islands of the entrance and are starting to create a dark "tunnel of vegetation" effect to the street. In addition to threatening the Crepe Myrtles, this condition is also killing off the Bermuda turf within the entrance's center islands and along both side of Windsor Drive and causing erosion in the area.

The Board plans to remove three trees on the LH side in this area, remove several small-to-medium size trees along the RH side that are arching-out of the wood line



over Windsor Drive, and will trim-off all of the remaining lower limbs on both sides that overhang the street. Once this work is completed we plan to re-establish the turf in the areas needed.

This work will require the cooperation of three property owners in this area, which the Board has begun contacting. We also have an excellent contractor



Royal Lakes has recently had a couple of reported late-night incidences of this old teenage prank now frequently called "Ding Dong Ditch" by the police. Both these incidences occurred in the Kenwood section of the community on Longmead Road. The most recent occurrence happened Friday, May 31st at 11PM and was witnessed by the residents next door who watched as "four teenage boys" walked up to their neighbor's front porch, banged "very loudly' on the door waking-up the owners, and then ran away down the street.

Unfortunately, what was once a childhood innocent summertime prank, though still a nuisance, in today's world carries with it more potential consequences for residents and communities. This is because homeowners today don't know if this is just a prank played by neighborhood kids, or perhaps someone doing this to "case the place" to see if anyone is at home with the intention to break-in and/or commit other crimes.

In both the above late-night Ding Dong Ditch episodes the owners immediately called the police who came out to investigate. This is a good idea because there could be more to these incidences than a simple prank and the police will be able to advise residents if there has been other such occurrences reported in the area and any that were followed by more serious criminal activity.

We encourage residents to report these types of incidences to the police. Please let the POA Board know as well so that we may keep track of the frequency and locations these incidents occur.

ARE YOU PICKING UP AFTER YOUR PET?

Besides being unsightly and smelly, animal waste can be hazardous to the health of our children who play in the community and to other pets. One of the most common forms of disease transmission between dogs is through fecal matter.

It is important to remember to immediately clean up after your pet even when walking on common property or vacant lots. When walking your dog, take along a baggie with you to pick up waste with and then dispose of it properly.

Also, remember that your dog needs to be leashed when outside of your property and not allowed to run unsupervised in the neighborhood.



TURTLE TALES

A female turtle following her instincts recently decided to lay her eggs in a neighbor's front yard bed. She probably came from the lake and after digging a hole she was spotted laying her eggs and covering the hole back up. She then returned to her home and the neighbors, worrying that a predator would find and eat the eggs, put a fence around and over the area to protect

the eggs. These very kind animal lovers are watching for the hatching and plan to video tape it.





IMPROVING THE AIR QUALITY IN YOUR HOUSE

You can help the air in your house to be as clean and fresh as possibly by taking some important steps:

Reduce the Humidity

Humidity affects air quality so maintaining humidity levels between 30% and 50% can make the air easier to breath. If the air is too dry you'll suffer from scratchy throat, cracked or irritated skin, and a dry nose. It can also damage wood floors and furnishings. However, if too humid, mold and mildew can develop which can leave stains on walls and ceilings, peel off paint and provide breeding places for termites and cockroaches. After you determine if your home is too dry or too moist by using a hygrometer to measure the moisture level in your home, you can use a humidifier if it is too dry and/or a dehumidifier if too moist.

Add Air-Filtering Plants

Plants in your house can naturally filter harmful chemicals in the air. The most effective plants to use for air filtering include peace lily, rubber plant, spider plant, ivy, ferns, prayer plant and philodendron. For optimal filtering, it is recommended to have one plant for every 100 square feet.

Use Natural Solutions

When buying candles or air fresheners, keep in mind that many common air fresheners contain VOCs (volatile organic compounds) but manufacturers are required only to label these toxins as "fresheners". Instead, you can improve the scent of your house with natural solutions—opening a window for 5 to 10 minutes to let in fresh air, slicing a lemon and placing it in water, simmering a pot of cinnamon and cloves, and using pure essential oils and soy candles.

Modify Your Routines

The most effective plants to use

for air filtering include peace

lily, rubber plant, spider plant,

ivy, ferns, prayer plant and

philodendron

You can also help maintain clean air in your house during your day-to-day routines:

- Check the filters on your heating and cooling systems and change when needed.
- While you're cooking, cleaning or painting, ventilate your room by turning on a vent or opening a window.
- Use a vacuum cleaner with a high-efficiency particulate air (HEPA) filter to remove pollen, pet dander, dust mites and toxins.
 - •Wash new fabrics, especially bedding and clothing, before their first use to remove chemicals used in the manufacturing process.
 - Burn cured or dried wood instead of pressure-treated options in your wood burning fireplace and have your chimney and flue cleaned and inspected regularly.
 - Test your house for radon, a radioactive, colorless, odorless gas that results from the natural decay of uranium found in soil and increases the risk of lung cancer.
 - Make smoking an outside activity so your house will remain smoke free.

• Bathe and groom pets if dander and fur are causing problems, and consider giving your pets their own beds. Also wipe your pet's paws after it has been outside.



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GOLF CART PATHS FOR GOLF USE ONLY

he Royal Lakes Golf & Country Club, its members and guests want to remind everyone that the golf course and

golf cart paths are private property. The cart paths should not be used for walking, biking or dog walking at any time. When someone is on the path who is not a golfer they are interfering with the play. Golfers must wait for them to clear the area for their safety so that the walker or biker is not hit by a ball.

Kids fishing in the lakes near the greens are another safety concern. The lakes are the property of the golf club and fishing in them is not allowed. Police will be called if anyone is seen fishing on the lakes.



A MESSAGE FROM CHIP SPILER RE GOLF CART JOYRIDING:

During this time of year, the golf course sees many people joy riding on golf carts. However, that activity produces many possible problems and concerns for the golf course.

Recently, our staff witnessed 5 different teenagers, driving private carts in places the carts should not be driven. In three instances, the carts were driven where it caused damage to the course. Yesterday afternoon, we had a cart, driven by a teenager ride on the number 2 green.

I'm asking the help of the parents who have personal golf carts to explain golf cart etiquette on a golf course to your children. One important rule that I ask is that no carts, for the purpose of joy riding, are driven on the golf course. Royal Lakes Golf & Country Club staff will approach violators. We will ask for identification; we will take pictures; and we will contact parents of any violators.

Royal Lakes Golf & Country Club works hard to provide and maintain a quality facility. We do not want to see it destroyed or damaged by carefree antics.


